NEVES, Katja

Dr. Katja Neves is currently associate professor of Sociology of the Environment and Social Sustainability at Concordia University, Montreal, Canada. She has recently completed two research grants from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC), Canada, and obtained a new Insight Grant in 2016 from SSHRC to investigate the contemporary reinvention of botanical gardens as agents of social and ecological biodiversity conservation. Her current SSHRC projects have unveiled a major historical paradigmatic shift in the global governance, hegemonic understanding, and practice of biodiversity conservation. Her findings demonstrate that from this perspective, embracing social roles such as integration, food security, social justice and equity is as important as engaging with plant ecology and plant management. This contrasts with the “fortress conservation” approach of the hegemonic neoliberal conservation model that predominated in Africa throughout the 1990s resulting in the eviction of local people from local ecosystems. Dr. Neves’ findings also suggest that the aforementioned transformations reflect a much wider transformation in global and national socio-ecological governance. These challenge extant theorization.
